BANK OF ENGLAND ARCHIVES

The Bank has a very extensive archive which covers every aspect of its administration and ranges from the Bank's foundation in 1649 to the present. The archive not only offers an internal information service to the Bank's various

departments but also provides research facilities for academics from all over the world. It holds a broad range of material of interest to researchers in a large numbers of fields. The records are of prime importance to economic historians but are also of potential interest to social and business historians, architectural specialists, biographer and genealogists.

The archive is catalogued on a free-text database which researchers are permitted to use in the searchroom. A set of bound lists is also available. Researchers are able to have access to most records over thirty years old. An information leaflet is available.

The archive is open every weekday from 10a.m. to 4.30p.m. To make an appointment, telephone the Archivist on 071-601 4889, or write to: The Archivist, Archive Section HO-M, The Bank of England, Threadneedle Street, London EC2R 8AH.

COURAGE ARCHIVE

AGM ON MONDAY 18 MARCH 1991 MINUTES

The minutes of the last meeting, having been circulated in "The Flowing Stream" were approved by the meeting. Their adoption was proposed by Mr. R. Wardale and seconded by Mr. R. Bullen. They were signed as a true record.

Secretary's report

"The Society has had a year of change. We have gained a new Chairman and now have a President. The job of Secretary has been made easier by Angela Kendrick taking over as Membership Secretary. The Society has found a new meeting place which I am sure you will agree is much cosier.

Within our area the Record Office has moved to new premises at Shoreham Street and unfortunately the opening hours of Local Studies and the Record Office have been shortened.

The Society Members have continued with their work of indexing and transcribing the 1861 and 1881 censuses. The publishing programme for the 1861 census is continuing after a brief halt in 1990.

I would like to thank all the committee for their work over the past year and the members for their support."

Treasurer's Report.

In presenting her account Mrs Allen said she thought the Society was in a healthy financial state and that there would be no need for an increase in subscriptions at present.

Income from subscriptions had been steady. Book sales showed a drop because of the saturation of the market and also because several sales opportunities (e.g. cancellation of Sheffield Local History Fair, 1989) had been missed. On the expenditure side journal costs, photocopying and duplicating, postage and telephone expenses were down as we profited from bulk buying in 1989. Room hire was also down as our rent at Cemetery Road Baptist Church was much lower than at the Blind Institute. Mrs Allen felt confident that finances in 1991 would present no problems. He will gladly pay any expenses or look up anything in Winchester Record Office if this would help someone. He is also seeking information on the East Yorkshire Regiment. 1914-1918.

TYAS Mr J.R.Tyas, 55, Clements Green Lane, South Woodham
WOODHEAD Ferrers, Essex. CM3 5JS is seeking information regarding the marriage of John Tyas and Elizabeth Woodhead, probably in Rotherham and presumably before 1837 since there is no record at the G.R.O. Also there is no mention in the I.G.I.
Mr. Tyas would also be grateful for photocopies or transcripts of articles in the Yorkshire Arch. Journal Vol. VII p.132 and Vol. XXXVIII p.357. Any expense incurred will naturally be reimbursed.

WHITELEY Mr. E.R. Whiteley, 2, The Fishermans, Emsworth, PO10 7BS is seeking information about Fanny Whiteley (nee Mason) born 1835 and her daughter Florence born 1856. They were last traced in the 1871 census as living at the Travellers Inn, Raymarsh, where the father, Thomas, was innkeeper, the family having previously farmed at Greasbrough for over 250 years. The mother, according to a headstone at Greasbrough Churchyard was buried in the family grave in 1878-aged 43 although no death certificate has been found so presumably she must have remarried

after the suicide of Thomas in a waterbutt at the Inn in 1872 (see Sheffield 8th July).

- WALTON Mr A. Walton, 30A, Stafford Road, Eccles, Manchester. M030 9FD is endeavouring to find the birthplace of his great-great-great-grandfather, David Walton. He was born in 1776 and enrolled in the West Yorkshire Militia in 1794. Unfortunately there do not appear to be any Militia records which give his place of birth. He is shown as a "substitute" and possibly came from one of the main centres of population in the Riding. Mr. Walton is carrying out a broad "sweep" of the Parish Registers of West Yorkshire but would welcome any information or clues which might assist him.
- HOLLAND Ruth Creech, 901, N. Hill Road, Fayetteville, NC 28303 USA is seeking information on several Yorkshire coalmining families (on 1871 Woolley Census) and their descendents.
- HARRISON 1. Joseph Holland (b. 1831? Warwickshire, d. 5 Nov. 1876) and wife Sarah Harrison (b. 1834? Sheffield - dau. of George Harrison - d. 14 Jan. 1879). Both are buried in Woolley-Chapelry graveyard.

THREE RAWMARSH TALES (cont.)

4. A WINNER AND A LOSER .

It must be a truism that most family historians, before becoming consumed by their passion, have listened to oft - repeated family stories without taking too much notice of the finer details. Then, when they are avid reseachers of their family history, they take the opposite course and write everything down that they hear from their relatives. The following story has both these elements: the broad outlines I had heard many times from my father since my childhood, and the finer points have been filled in since my father's death by his brother and sister. However, there is one particular point that remains a mystery and I deeply regret that the persons who could clear it up are no longer alive.

Swimming in stagnant water.

I should not have made so much of this story concerning my father - it is fairly ordinary - if I had not been looking at everything I could find to do with the Silver City area of Rawmarsh. When I started reading the file on the Rawmarsh Isolation Hospital, which was situated just at the top of Park Street where my family lived, I realised that here was very interesting material and, whether I wanted it or not, I was drawn into the tragic death of a young Irish nurse in 1926.

That year was of course, the year of the miner's strike and the General Strike. My father, at that time a 17 year old miner with lots of time on his hands, used to do all sorts of things to keep himself occupied. One activitiy was swimming, and that is where the trouble started. One day he, along with friends, went swimming in a disused pond at some chemical works down Mangham Road, on the way to Greasbrough. Unfortunately the water was stagnant and my father contracted enteric fever. The Rawmarsh Medical Officer's official report puts it thus: "One case of Enteric Fever was admitted to the Hospital on July 11th. This gave a reaction of Paratyphoid. He made an excellent recovery." Although my father is nowhere mentioned by name it was he alright. The family version of

events is much more graphic, starting with the fact that my grandmother was caused unnecessary distress because the doctor sent a boy to the house to inform her my father was in hospital, rather than tell her himself. Then the usual picture emerges: "at death's door".... "lucky to be alive".... "thin as a rake when he returned home".... "could not eat solids for weeks." I am not so sure my father was in grave danger, though he must have been very poorly. Enteric fever was endemic in the district, but not often fatal. Of 78 cases between 1911 and 1926 only 10 ended in death. There is humour, too. My father's brothers and sisters would regularly sit on the wall outside the hospital, call to him and throw buns, biscuits or sweets through the window - much to the consternation of the medical staff. My father delighted in playing tricks on one of the nurses; he imitated the whistle which was her boyfriend's call sign and sent her into all kinds of confusion! Yet it is on reading that file, in which a nurse features so prominently, that humour must give way to sadness.

Three letters

The most interesting feature of this section of the Roschill Hospital file is contained in three letters written to Mr. A.H.Jackson, Clerk to Rawmarsh Urban District Council, by Nurse N. McGonigle on behalf of her deceased sister, Nurse Catherine McGonigle. The first, dated 6th September 1926 and sent from the family home in Ballyshannon, County Donegal, is, like the other two, written in a deferential manner. The letters are correct, polite and are clearly written by someone of modest yet spirited character. They have a faintly ingenuous quality. A bitterness and sense of grievance, seemingly justifiable, are nevertheless genuinely felt in the writer's words. She begins by thanking the council for its expressions of sympathy shown to her parents at the loss of their daughter. However, it soon becomes clear that her sister's death is, in her opinion, due to neglect:

"Her death came as such a shock to each one of us and then to think that the poor girl was kept on duty until practically dying on her feet.

I shall always & ever blame Miss Ellis for her neglect to my sister when she first complained of feeling ill.

If she had only been removed to bed then she would have been a living girl today, but she was sheerly neglected from the first"

But she does not wish to pursue her criticisms or make a formal complaint; she merely enquires, very politely, if she may be reimbursed for the considerable expense she has been put to, having had to transport the body back to Ireland.

She next writes in October, again from Ballyshannon. Apparently the council had misinterpreted her previous letter and believed the family were making a claim because of negligence. She has to reassure them this is not so, and she repeats her request for compensation:

"It certainly was a very big expense of course. I now leave the whole matter to you and your members discretion as to what you do for me & if possible to help me "

She feels, too, there ought to be wages or what she quaintly calls "Lloyd George" coming to her sister; but the matron has not replied to a letter enquiring about this. This second letter ends with a plea full of pathos and the frustration of a simple Irish girl faced with English bureaucracy:

"I should be pleased if you could advise me what to do. I consider it very unfair that I didn't receive same during my sisters illness or after her death, but I presume that with me living in Ireland nobody thought it worthwhile to worry about me or my sisters business affairs."

The third letter is written about six weeks later from Beckett Hospital, Leeds and is more businesslike. Now it appears as if her father is on the point of making a claim against the council for expenses. The parting shot, still blaming the hospital but also hoping for an amicable settlement and trusting in officialdom, reads as follows:

"... she dying practically of neglect and the Rotherham doctors saying she was three weeks advanced in the fever when she was warded. I would very much wish to seeing a consultation with you before father takes the matter any further than his own solicitor."

Payment without liability

The letters from the council would, of course, have made interesting reading and would have put the other side. What the file also contains is a series of letters from the Ocean Accident & Guarantee Corporation Ltd of Leeds. It is apparent that the council fully expected a formal claim for compensation to be made. A form, filling in the details of the nurse's employment, is included, but sadly the attached report of the way the deceased met her death is missing. Interestingly the question "Has any verbal or other intimation of claim been received?" has been left blank. Eventually a letter of 6th January 1927 from the Ocean Corporation concludes:

"that the disease from which the nurse suffered was not contracted from the patient who was in the hospital."

They felt the case did not fall under the Workman's Compensation Act; however, in a letter of 7th April they changed ground slightly and offered money:

"In view of the circumstances of the Nurse's death, and the information we have obtained, we are of the opinion that there may be some justification for the suggestion that the case is one falling within the provisions of the Workman's Compensation Act, and, although this is very doubtful, we have decided to meet the case by a payment of £30, without admitting liability in respect of the Nurse's death."

Who was to blame?

So, that was the end of the affair. No admission of guilt, but £30 to keep the family quiet; or so it would appear. The question that concerns me is not really whether the medical staff at the hospital were blameworthy, but whether or not my father was the direct cause of Nurse McGonigle's death. The Medical Officer in his report for 1926, seems to hint that she herself was partly responsible:

"Unfortunately one of your nurses, Miss McSonigle (sic), developed a very serious type of Enteric Fever, which proved fatal from Haemorrhage (intestinal). It was never quite clear how she contracted the disease, as it was no part of her duty to attend to the case of Enteric. The Insurance Company, I believe, made a grant toward payment of the funeral expenses. Every care is taken to instruct all nurses as to their duty to themselves in nursing any case of infectious disease, but I am sorry that some of them do not attend to these instructions."

The only admission from the hospital comes in a statement, also in the file, when the matron (who took up her duties after the incident took place) writes that she had been informed that the only time Nurse McGonigle came into contact with my father was to help to lift a bedstead on which he was lying. Certainly the rules of the hospital appeared very strict, as one would expect in an institution with fever cases. Yet my uncle recalls, when he was a paper boy, having completely free access and being able to talk to anybody in the hospital. The food thrown through the windows indicates laxness. So perhaps there was a cover-up. Certainly it appears she worked when she was very ill. Perhaps she had far more contact with my father than she should have or was known about. I have a vague recollection that my father brought an Irish nurse, whom he liked and who gave him special treats, into the story. Perhaps she was the nurse thrown into confusion by his whistles. But, I cannot be sure. I can only wonder at the fate of this 23-year-old fever nurse. My father went on to live a full, healthy and active life, but she died so young. Perhaps there are some documents we ought not to go poking into. Or does family history call for emotional detachment?

MAINLY ABOUT WALTON AND NICHOLLS STRAYS
FROM AROUND SHEFFIELD AND DISTRICT

The Walton and Nicholls families had an association when they lived around Sheffield, England before emigrating in the 1860's to Auckland, New Zealand. Especially in the first decade or two following their arrival that association was continued when they lived in and around Thames, NZ. This is reflected in cemetery records which are discussed in relation to the groups who emigrated from England.

In an article entitled "Some Family History With A Yorkshire Kidnapping" [J. of Sheffield and District F.H.S. 96,10(4),1990] reference was made to Waltons and Nicholls who emigrated from England to Auckland, New Zealand in 1865 and 1863. Prior to emigration our Waltons were recorded in census data as in Table I, with names in bold for the three who emigrated on the clipper ship Empress in 1865. It is noted that they lived in a draper's shop on Manchester Rd, Stocksbridge, YKS, in 1861. This also is discussed by Joseph Kenworthy in Stocksbridge & District Band of Hope Industrial Co-operative Soc. Ltd Jubilee History 1860 - 1910, Published: Manchester Co-operative Printing Soc., 118 Corporation St, Manchester, 1910.

At the time of the census in April 1861 Elizabeth (Lizzie) Walton, as present with her parents for the 1851 and 1841 census dates (Table I), apparently was in Chesterfield with her Uncle Benjamin who had a clothing shop on Spencer St. This was just prior to Lizzie's May 1861 marriage.

For the 1861 census Reuben Nicholls, his parents, brother John, married sister Elizabeth and brother-in-law (William Bennett) were in Nottingham, after Reuben, his sister and their parents had been in Corbridge, Hasland, DBY for the 1841 census, as in Table II. Oral family history, although not always very reliable, has it that Thomas Nicholls [another son of Joseph Nicholls, blacksmith, and his wife Ann (née Allwood) born 19 November 1841 at Hasland, Chesterfield, DBY (GRO, London)], had gone to North America prior to 1861. However, contact with him was lost and there is no information to hand indicating whether or not he stayed there.

A shipping card index in Auckland Public Library (APL) indicates that all those named in bolder for the 1861 Nottingham census in Table II emigrated from England on the sailing ship Tyburnia in 1863. The remaining adult indexed in that group was Reuben's wife Lizzie (née Walton) and more about her is in Table I. Two spellings appear on the shipping cards for the Nicholls/Nichols surname with Annie Mary Bennett on her grandparents' card as "Annie M." In passing it is noted that for the Waltons, Joseph Lewis Walton appears in the shipping card index as "Joseph Lerrey Walton".

Apart from conventional records such as those of births, marriages and deaths, further substantiation of the validity of the cross relationship between census data and shipping records presented in the above comes from contact with a network of descendants of the Walton and Nicholls emigrants.

During August 1991 the writer, Vivian Harold Nicholls and Rex Walton Montgomery, all great-grandsons of Reuben and Lizzie Nicholls who have known each other since the late 1920's, went on a field trip to Thames, N.Z. joining there with Florence Elizabeth Crawford (née Walton), granddaughter of Joseph Lewis Walton. In a co-operative effort burial data were obtained from the office of the Thames and Coromandel District Council (TCDC) and plots were visited in Shortland cemetery.

Much of this cemetery is on a hillside, very slippery when wet, as at the time of our visit, and much is extremely overgrown. It took Florence and her husband 2-3 days to locate and uncover Plot 1672 where seven Waltons were buried as detailed in Table III. These Waltons include the three who were in Stocksbridge, YKS for the 1861 census (Table I). APL microfiche data for those Waltons in Shortland cemetery had previously been noted.

Plot plans for Shortland cemetery are available on three A3 sheets numbered 1-95003-1, 1-95003-2 and 1-96003-3 with about 4500 plots overall. It is roughly estimated that the burial registers could contain over 2,000 strays. For early burials, 1869-1883, there is an Index, based on archives, with names under letters of the alphabet in order of Interment No. with no place of birth shown. After 1883 the registers, accessible in copy form, generally include information on religion and birthplace, as reflected by the data presented in Table III.

Table III also includes data for four of the group from the Tyburnia, namely, Reuben and Elizabeth Nicholls in Plot 1811 plus William and Elizabeth Bennett in the adjacent Plot 1812.

Records for Omaha cemetery near Puriri, also are held in the TCDC office. According to William Williams, Bishop of Waiapu, in Christianity among the New Zealanders, first published in 1867, the Church Missionary Society selected Puriri as the site for a mission station in 1833.

In the years before Reuben Nicholls died in 1917 he was living on a farm at Puriri with his son Joseph Reuben Walton Nicholls, known as Walton Nicholls. Walton had previously bought the farm from the estate of his uncle, William Bennett. Reuben's brother John Nicholls, according to the Register of Shortland cemetery, also was residing at Puriri when he paid

£3.0.0 for the purchase in perpetuity of Plot 1811 in 1891. Other details of plot purchases are available at the TCDC office.

It was in 1901 that Omaha cemetery had its first interment which was for Joseph Nicholls, age 91, as detailed further in Table IV. His wife Ann Nicholls, age 93, was buried in the same plot in 1910 and that couple corresponds to the Joseph and Ann Nicholls in the 1861 census data for Nottingham (Table II). Their son John and his wife were buried alongside in Plot 1, as also detailed further in Table IV.

The burials of Joseph Lewis Walton at Shortland cemetery in 1925 and John Nicholls at Omaha cemetery in 1918 meant that the three Waltons at Stocksbridge, YKS in 1861 (Table I) and the seven adults on the Tyburnia, comprised of six listed for the 1861 census in Nottingham (Table II) plus Lizzie Nicholls (néé Walton) at Chesterfield in 1861 (Table I et seq.), all had been buried in TCDC Shortland/Omaha cemeteries.

In addition to the family group of seven adults on the Tyburnia there were three children. The eldest, Annie Mary Bennett (Table I), on 18 Dec. 1880 at the home of John Nicholls married Andrew Johnson Swan, from Denmark and a miner from Karaka Creek, Thames. He came to be buried at Omaha cemetery (Table IV) on the same day as Joseph Nicholls in 1901 as a consequence of a mining accident at Waikino, near Waihi. That sad day of burials was on the thirteenth birthday of Andrew's daughter Lillian. His wife died 13.04.1944 and was buried at Waikumete, Auckland.

Annie Mary's sister Rose Georgina Bennett was born 10 June 1862 and baptized on 24 August 1862 in the Parish of St Mary, Nottingham and was a little under a year old when the Tyburnia sailed for Auckland. Rose Georgina married Cornelius John Wood, brother of William Wood, a well known grocer in Thames. Rose's husband, Cornelius John Wood, who was born in England, was buried on 19.01.1899, age 49, at Shortland cemetery in Plot 979, a few days before Annie Maud Mary Walton (Table III). His widow Rose died on 25.09.1927 and was buried in Hillsborough cemetery, Auckland.

Annie Mary and Rose had New Zealand born siblings including Alice Nicholls Mitchell (néé Bennett) and Frederick William Bennett, who lived on farms at Puriri after their parents' death and overlapping with when the Walton Nicholls family lived there. Alice and Fred were buried in Omaha cemetery with their respective spouses as indicated in Table IV.

The third and youngest child with the seven adults on the Tyburnia was Lillian Nicholls, daughter of Reuben and Lizzie Nicholls, born 3 August 1862 at Rye Hills Cottages, Nottingham, England. As a child, she died at Coromandel, NZ on 19 February 1868.

ADDENDUM: MAINLY ABOUT HERRINGSHAW STRAYS

Reference was made above to Rose Georgina Bennett's brother-in-law, William Wood. He was born 20.08.1847, City Road, London and his children, some of whom the writer remembers, were first cousins of Walton Nicholls' wife Nellie (néé Hieatt). Her mother Martha Hieatt (néé Herringshaw) and William's wife Anne Wood (néé Herringshaw) were sisters and were buried alongside each other in Shortland cemetery. They were born 24.06.1847, Nocton, LIN and 26.04.1857, Sudbrook, LIN respectively (The Hieatt Centenary, 1883-1983, and writer's collection).

The Shortland cemetery records of burial of Martha and Anne's parents are summarized in Table V. These are great, great-grandparents of the writer, and according to Wm. Wood's diary arrived in Auckland, 4.02.1880.

THE JORDANS Part 2

In 1823 Joseph Chambers took out a rental of Kimberworth Farm and the coal beneath Kimberworth Field. He worked the coal from the Swallow Wood Pit from which he laid a wagon line to Jordan Dam. The line passed behind Darley Park and along a course of the present footpath to a staithes at the dam where the wagons were unloaded into barges which came down from Tinsley Lock. This line which was known as the Holmes Railway passed in front of the cottages at the dam until the excavating of the new cut from Rotherham provided for the shorter route.

In 1835 the River Don Co. excavated the new canal from the Rotherham Cut to Jordan Dam so bypassing the original route through Deadmans Hole. After the activities of the navvies had finished and the masons and carpenters had erected the lock into the dam the tenants of Jordan Dam Cottages found a continous procession of horses drawing barges passing their doors. The canal was the industrial highway between the Humber and an ever growing Sheffield.

The following year the navvies descended upon Jordan again. A few yards behind the cottages the hillside was excavated for a cutting to lay the lines of the Rotherham to Sheffield Railway. The cottages were sandwiched where the railway and the canal came closest together. Under the front window the clip clop of the barge horse could be heard while from over their heads at the back window came the rattle and clatter of the steam engines and their train of wagons.

Each succeeding year the volume of traffic increased. Another railway line was added bringing the trains even closer. As Sheffield's population and industry increased the rivers became dirtier. Its stench was deplored by railway travellers. The fields through which John Holland took his pleasant walk from Brightside Lane became the Sheffield Sewage Works. The works spread across Blackburn Meadows to the river at Jordan, then leapt over, covering the fields of Holmes Farm as far as Holmes Lock. On the site of Walkers Iron Works the blast furnaces cast a pall of smoke and fumes over the area from which descended a continual fall of grit and cinders. At night the flame which issued from the top greeted the rail traveller as he emerged from the Jordan Cutting. The fitful blaze made the surroundings unreal. In 1858 a Mr Tom Harcastle was walking along the canal bank to Sheffield. At Jordan Dam he stepped into the water instead of onto the footbridge. It was presumed he had missed his step due to the glare from the furnace.

William Hickman moved from the stone house at Jordan Dam to a piece of land by the incline named Darling Park, which by usage, became Darley Park.. William Hickman may have had a hand in the construction of the incline and the winding house at Darley Park for, afterwards, he was in business as a joiner, builder and wright until his death in the 1840's- perhaps not very successfully for, after his death, his widow is described as a pauper. The house stayed in the family after her death. William the son who, prior to his marriage, was a journeyman, returned to Jordan and lived in his father's house as a wheelwright.

A further five houses were built at Jordan during the eighteen forties, four houses between William Hickman's house and the canal near the wharfe, and a stone house on Darley Park which was called until its demolition the "Round House". This was occupied by the incline keeper and may have been a weighbridge. The stone house at Jordan Dam which had been occupied by the smiths and wrights became the lock keeper's house and the three houses became known as Jordan Lock Cottages.

The Swallow Wood Pit was closed in 1851 and the incline fell into disuse. A caretaker moved into the Round House, reputedly rent free, to guard the incline. Further development on the railway brought platelayers to Jordan and a signalman to the Round House.

A momentous occasion at Jordan would have been the Sheffield Flood of 1864 when the river suddenly rose and dead cattle and debris came rushing into the dam and over the weir.

The road to Jordan was, from Kimberworth, a continuation of the present South Street. A level crossing was made when the railway was laid below the present Meadowbank Hotel. A gate post still survives today. The incline, while it was in operation, had been used by foot passengers, the railway crossing it by an "inconsiderate" bridge. After the tramway was taken up the Midland Railway Co., finding they could not stop the public using it later built a more substantial bridge. In 1900 the level crossing was closed and a footbridge erected adjacent to the cottages at Jordan Lock.

In 1902 with the development of Pembroke Street, a mains water pipe was laid down the incline to Jordan but the large water butts which stood by the front doors at Lock Cottages were still retained for some time.

With the closing of the level crossing Jordan was dependent upon the bridge at Darley Park for wheeled vehicles. One day in 1908 the inhabitants found the bridge closed by a fence of iron railings set in concrete. The owner of the land at the side of the incline had found she also owned half the incline, While she had no objection to pedestrians crossing her land she objected to it being used as a road. News of the closure reached the corporation and another peculiar event occurred. At two o' clock in the morning the borough engineer with a party of workmen carrying crowbars arrived at Darley Park and pulled the railing down.

A court case resulted in which the corporation brought witnesses who had used the road for many years. Amongst them was Andrew Hickman, who remembered the Midland Railway putting up obstructions on a previous occasion. He was one of those who tore them down. James Hopkins said he had lived at the Round House for thirty two years and had never seen anyone stopped from using the road. William Poole, who was seventy, said he went to live at Jordan at the age of three and on leaving school went to work at the colliery. (In the 1851 census he

is Hoole and in the 1861 census he is Yoole) Witnesses were brought who remembered "No Trespassing" notices being posted. Amongst them was a gentleman of 78 years who had been an agent for George Wilton Chambers at the colliery which had been closed fifty seven years before.

It was found that those who had bought the land on either side had also bought the incline but a condition was that the incline must not be built upon and must remain open for eventual use as a street. Perhaps the condition still pertains for the road is little changed from when it was the colliery incline.

The cottages at Jordan Lock were demolished immediately after the Second World War but the cobble stones which fronted the stone house are still intact. The houses at Darley Park, built prior to 1900 have been demolished and the Round House was pulled down in 1957. The land around Deadmans Hole has been raised some eight to ten feet but the timber balks on either side of the ford can still be seen when the river is low.

The author wishes to thank Mr. A. Bell and Mr. E. Jones, the present occupants of Darley Park, and also Mr H. Thompson, whose family had occupied Mr Hickman's house at Darley Park.

FROM THE RECORDS OF HOLLINGWORTH AND PICKARD LTD.

My Grandfather Ernest Edgar Hollingworth established his business in 1887. He was a Chamois Leather Dresser and Industrial Glove Manufacturer. He later became an Industrial and Domestic Brush manufacturer.

On the death of my brother Noel Douglas Hollingworth in 1984 the business was wound up. During the clearing of the premises an old box of papers was found. The papers are in mixed condition, some good and some very poor.

During the time the business was in existence it supplied many types of shops and factories in the Sheffield area, some of which may never have been shown in a trade or telephone directory.

MORE ABOUT DEAD BEETS.

You never know what you may discover when you investigate your ancestry. A friend of mine gave up her search when she found a Victorian newspaper cutting. It informed her that her grandfather had been found "insensate in the privy of a public house".

In a previous article I mentioned that I had traced my ancestry back to Anthony Beete, cutler, who died in 1616. There was no mention of any Beets in the Cathedral registers before 1600.

I was told that details of sixteenth century wills still survived, and that copies could be obtained from the Borthwick Institute of Historical Research. The Institute supplied me with photographic copies of four Beet wills dating from 1558 to 1630 and details of five grants of administration between 1592 and 1617. Anthony Beet had left no will, despite the fact that he left over £40, a sizeable sum in those days. Administration of his estate was granted to his widow, Cecelia. I already knew from Cathedral records that Cecelia Beete married Thomas Scargell in 1617. I also knew that Anthony and Cecelia had had three sons, Robtus (Robert), John and Edward. Records of the Company of Cutlers stated that Robert Beet was apprenticed to Thomas Scargell, cutler, in 1629. The wills and grants of administration seem to suggest that my family may have originated from Beetes living in the Greasbrough / Rotherham area in the sixteenth century. Documents from that time can be difficult to read. Some letters were written differently from today. For example, the letter "r" might be written

as:

2 2 2 T 22 6 2 2

In 1630 Edward Beete of Greasbrough wrote "I...bequeath my soul to Almighty God hopinge of a joyfull resurrection by my Saviour Christ Jesus and my body to be buried in the Church or Churchyard of Rotheram."

He left two sisters-in-law five shillings each. "both which legacies shall be a full satisfaction for challenginge and demandinge any more of my goods or chattells".

After making a bequest to his niece, Susan, Edward left the rest of his estate to his widow, except for his "best coate, dublet and britches". These he left to a friend.

Most of these early Beets seem to have been husbandmen or yeoman farmers. Finding out about earlier years is not easy. Surnames only became hereditary in the thirteenth and fourteenth centuries. Most church registers do not go back beyond 1540.

Sometimes there may be a reference to someone with a given surname in the records of a Manorial Court, but there is usually no way of establishing a family relationship. For example, Manorial records show that a Clarice Beete was fined two pence for brewing ale in the fifteenth century. I do not know if she is related to me. In any event I think that I would rather be a relative of Sir Richard Beete who was chaplain of Rawmarsh in 1410!

After 1600 information is easier to find. In 1638-9 Edward Beete donated 2s. towards the building of the first Cutlers' Hall: His brother, Robert, gave 4s. However, in 1632 Jo Beete had been fined 13s 4d for working "without mark or freedom". Not everyone could become a cutler. It was necessary to complete a seven-year apprenticeship and to be awarded the freedom of the Company. A Mark Book was kept which listed the mark or marks authorised to be used by each individual cutler.

Life was hard in the seventeenth and eighteenth centuries. Leonardus Beete, who married Anne Clay in 1660, had at least nine children, five boys and four girls. Only three girls and none of the boys survived to reach adult life. Boys were more likely to die than girls in infancy. On the other hand many of the girls died later in life in child-birth. Anthony Beete (1641-1701) was widowed no fewer than three times.

The summit of Beet achievement in the Company of Cutlers was probably in 1724-5 when Jeremy Beet became Master of the Company. He paid several large sums towards the rebuilding of the Cutlers' Hall in 1726. Thrift being a Beet virtue he charged £2 4s 8 1/2d interest on his donation. His successor, not a Beet, was even thriftier and charged interest the following year, even though the donation was not his.

Several of my relatives were both cutlers and victuallers. Benjamin Beet was landlord of the Old Shakspear, 48, Gibraltar Street, in 1828. He married Mary Champion, daughter of William Champion, brewer of Campo Lane.

Records of the Burgery of Sheffield (The Town Trustees) state that in 1830 a Mr. Ellison "undertook that the premises at Bower Spring held by one Beet, a publican, shall be restored to their former state, and be thrown open to the public as heretofore."

I wonder what that was all about!
