### **1861 Census Index of Sheffield - For Sale at Bargain Prices!**

Because of rising publication costs it has been decided that future parts of this index will be put on microfiche rather than hard copy. This will mean that more piece numbers can be published together and also the price of a fiche will be considerably less than the cost of printed indexes. Most people now have access to a microfiche reader at their local record office or library so it is hoped that the new plan will be both acceptable and advantageous to members.

We have a large number of back copies of the already published editions of the 1861 census index that we are anxious to sell as they are not helping anyone whilst they are in our cupboards. It has been decided to sell the copies already published at 50p per part. If 9 parts are ordered at once they will be sent post free UK or one IRC coupon per issue for overseas Surface Mail. Otherwise, postage is 40p UK; 55p Overseas Surface Mail; 90p Airmail for single editions.

### **West Yorkshire Archives Postal Research**

West Yorkshire Archives welcomes visitors to its offices. There is no entrance fee and access to documents is free of charge. In addition they can now offer a limited postal service to enquirers. For a non-returnable fee, payable in advance, their staff will consult the manuscript, microform or printed sources available at the offices of the Service. The fee is £10.00 for a search of up to half an hour. This includes VAT, postage and one free photocopy. Extra copies are charged for at the current rate set by the West Yorkshire Archive Service, subject to copyright law. Cheques should be made payable to Wakefield Metropolitan District Council. Overseas payments should be in pounds sterling by International Money Order or by cheque drawn on a British bank.

There is no guarantee that relevant information will be found. However, the sources searched will be listed and enquirers will be informed of any useful material that is available.

The amount of time spent is restricted to half an hour. For longer searches you are advised to contact an independent record agent to undertake work for you.

The index also includes two orphanages, a children's hospital and a home for women - all of which list residents from near and far. There is also a shipping schedule showing the vessels moored in the river with details of their crews.

## **FEDERATION NEWS AND INFORMATION**

### **Information on FFHS Project**

For many years societies have produced Members' Interests Directories in which members have been able to 'advertise' the families they are researching, hoping that others, interested in the same names, would be able to exchange information.

The same was true for the well-known 'County families' directories, produced by John P. Perkins, which proved to be very popular and the information reached further afield with more subscribers than the local society booklets.

It is now time to set up a national list of family names being researched by family historians to complement the present system of county / society / regional directories to which only a comparative few contribute. The Federation of Family History Societies is sponsoring a project to list all the families being researched in the British Isles - to be known as 'The British Isles Genealogical Register'.

It will be open to everyone, not just members of family history societies. There are hundreds of people out there who are content to do their own thing and do not wish to belong to a society, or are totally ignorant of the fact that such things as family history societies exist and so cannot appreciate the give and take of information that is available. I've seen the surprise on some faces when told!

The application forms will be made available to local history societies, record offices, libraries and family history societies\* throughout the U.K. Family historians living outside the U.K. with ancestral roots in the British Isles will also be invited to contribute.

Each entrant submits their research names with places and dates for a £1 fee per form which will cover the operating costs of the project. Unlike other directories, the 'British Isles Genealogical Register' will be available in county sections - e.g. the Yorkshire section will contain Yorkshire interests only, thus helping family historians to concentrate their interests within one county. This should increase the possibilities of 'family contacts', and enable them to select only the counties in which they are interested. Scotland, Ireland & Wales will be treated as countries in three separate sections. The entries for each county will be free to all the societies of that county as hard copy or micro-fiche. Each society will be free to publish the information as a book or on micro-fiche, or hold it as a referral index for their area, as it wishes.

The Federation of Family History Societies invites you to register the surnames that you are researching in the British Isles. In this way, you can make your interests known to thousands of other family historians - world wide.

If YOU have family interests scattered over counties in England, Ireland, Scotland, Wales & the Channel Islands you could have your entries publicised in ALL of them. This is an opportunity not to be missed. Watch out for the BIG R!

## SOCIETY MEETINGS

### *A.G.M. on 15 February 1993 - Minutes*

*Present.* Ninety five members and visitors, with Mrs M.P.Dunn in the Chair. There were two apologies for absence.

*Minutes* of the last A.G.M. were approved and signed following a proposition of Mr Marshall seconded by Professor Newton.

### *Matters Arising .*

The Secretary said that, following a suggestion regarding giving a welcome to new members, Committee members were now in attendance from 6.45pm to greet new members and discuss any family history problems with them.

### *Secretary's Report.*

"Compared to 1991 when my predecessor retired part way through the year, 1992 was reasonably uneventful so far as the administrative side of the Society's work was concerned. I am most grateful for the initial and continuing support I have received from the Officers, committee and from many individual members. There are a number of people, not all on the Committee, who do a great deal of practical work to help our Society - one hesitates to mention individuals because it is always possible some deserving person is omitted. With a membership of approaching 700 (i.e. 7 times the number of people in this room) our Society now has to be run along business lines. It is time-consuming voluntary work for some of us, but the load could be lightened if a few more of you would come forward to help with the running of the organisation, or to undertake transcribing, indexing and recording. I am appealing here especially to locally-based members. Please consider whether you could take up a share of the routine work, which does not necessarily require specialist family history know-how, or join the folk who are doing transcribing and indexing of records, or are involved in other projects. Such work can often be rewarding for you in your own research and is always deeply appreciated by those members who live out of town or overseas and do not have easy access to our local records, registers, monumental inscriptions and so on."

### *Treasurer's Report.*

"Following last year's large deficit the Committee and I have kept a careful check on the finances in 1992. As well as taking the measures described at the 1992 AGM we had a "mini account" half way through 1993 which has resulted in a much healthier-looking set of accounts this time. In view of this the Committee do not consider it necessary to recommend a subscription increase, although it may be desirable to raise subscriptions next year and I give you notice of that possibility.

I should like to draw your attention to the increase in insurance rates and even further increases are forecast, including higher excesses payable on any claims made. Will members take extra care with any Society property in their temporary possession please."

The Treasurer then presented the Annual Accounts and these were formally approved and passed after being proposed by Professor Newton and seconded by Mrs Furey.

The Chairman and Treasurer both expressed thanks to our Auditor, Mr G, Lyon and the meeting agreed with these sentiments.

### *Editor's Report .*

"The journals for 1992 began with the inclusion of an account of the Sheffield Conference but after that material was slow to arrive and I had to put in one of my rare requests for copy. Happily, it was heeded and a number of articles arrived within a short time of my plea being published. To those who responded to my urgent request and all the other members who have sent in copy for "The Flowing Stream" I should like to say thank you. Without their contributions there would not have been any magazines.

As usual my report is mainly a recording of my and the Society's appreciation to the many people who work behind the scenes ensuring that the Society's activities function smoothly. Thanks are due to Elaine Smith who records all the members' addresses and produces the address labels used in sending out the journals and to my daughter Susan Hammond, who, in addition to her work as Librarian, finds time to help me in many ways.

Amongst the important achievements of our Society are our efforts in the indexing of records. On behalf of the Society I should like to thank Mary Robson and her team of transcribers who have worked so hard at the indexing of the 1881 census, a task now nearing completion. All who work at the 1861 census indexing also deserve our thanks.

Finally, on behalf of us all, I should like to thank Frank Westwood who has produced a list of all the contents of our library for members to buy."

### *Election of Officers and Committee*

In thanking all the officers and committee members, Mrs Dunn especially thanked Professor Newton, Mrs Perkins, Mrs Robson and Mr Wardale,

### Migration into Sheffield

Mike Williams' fascinating talk began with a list of his sources for studying population history.

Mr Williams has made a study of the 1861 census in Sheffield. 185,000 people were recorded at that time and his sample was of 45,000 people - a quarter of the city's population. The method used was to take a sector of the city, the NW quarter, since the city is roughly circular. The area delineated covered 11 Enumerator's Districts, from the centre to the outskirts. He then considered the birthplaces of all the inhabitants of his quadrant.

His findings were as follows:

Of the Yorkshire born residents 87% came mainly from towns such as Leeds, Wakefield and Rotherham. They were not rural people.

The 3,028 Celtic immigrants were mainly Irish and were rural in origin.

The 266 Scottish immigrants were from towns.

There were only 35 Welsh people recorded as S. Wales was having a boom at this time.

Most of the Irish arrived after the famine. Groups were segregated and were Irish speaking. In the subdistricts where Irish were found they represented about 30% of the population

The Welsh were traced by their name frequency in directories although it was not possible to count their numbers accurately. Up to 1934 the Welsh who came to Sheffield were shopkeepers etc from North Wales. After World War 2 there was a strong influx from South Wales, possibly because of the steel works. Probably so few Welsh came to Sheffield because Birmingham was between the city and Wales.

The majority of foreigners came from Prussia and other German states and from Poland.

There was a strong correlation between Lancashire and the Irish.

As one moved out to the peripheral areas of the quadrant most of the inhabitants were Yorkshire born. The longest established residents moved to better housing out of the smoke. The Germans and Poles were very localised and clustered together. The Irish were grouped but each group was segregated from the others.

1861 was the date when the town population was increasing rapidly, although this

effect continued for a long time afterwards. It was the start of the "big works"era. But it may be that migration patterns were very different in the 10 years following 1861.

Mike Williams' conclusion was that movement was definitely from one town to a larger town and not the movement of people from the countryside into the town. He doubted that workers in heavy industry came from the agricultural areas of Nottinghamshire and Lincolnshire. He expressed great interest in receiving information from members.

## THE RETURN OF OWNERS OF LAND 1873

These records, which exist for all counties of England, Wales, Scotland and Ireland, are also known as the modern Domesday. They were compiled in response to allegations in Parliament after the 1861 Census, which showed that there were only 30,000 landowners. John Bright, a noted Victorian radical, claimed that a harmful monopoly existed in land, and that fewer than 150 men owned half the land in England.

The Government argued that many landowners had not so described themselves in the Census, but disguised themselves as gentlemen or farmers etc. Concern was such, however, that the Government ordered the Local Government Boards, in 1872, to compile a return from rating records. There was one return for England and Wales, and separate ones appeared for Scotland and Ireland in 1876. Predictably the return failed to convince either side in the dispute, and even modern historians have found it difficult to detach their political principles from the statistical analysis of the figures.

The final results show that in England and Wales (excluding the Metropolis) 269,547 owned more than one acre of land, while a further 703,289 owned less than one acre. 43,000 people owned more than 100 acres, and 710 people owned 5,000 acres or more. The latter owned over 25% of the total area.

The England and Wales section was published as Return of Owners of Land 1873 (House of Commons Papers 1874 (C.1097) LXXII part 1 and 2), and the Scottish and Irish ones published subsequently. The Returns were published as Parliamentary Papers and are therefore to be found in the larger reference libraries, but they have to date received scant attention from genealogists and are not covered by most of the standard texts on the subject. The return is organised by County, and then in strict alphabetical order by surname of landowner.

The Return gives the extent and value of lands held by each landowner, if he holds more than one acre in the county concerned. The address of the landowner is given, sometimes outside the county, but unfortunately the location of the land owned is not shown.

The author has produced a facsimile of the original Return on microfiche, for the West Riding of Yorkshire, together with explanatory booklet. The Return contains over 16,500 names and is on two fiche. It can be obtained from the author at 48, Badshot Park, Badshot Lea, Farnham, Surrey GU9 9JZ price £3.00 post free (cheques payable to T.J.Wilcock). Similar facsimiles are also available for many other English counties - send an SAE to the above address for details.

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## FAMILY SEARCH COMPUTER PROGRAMME

The Church of Jesus Christ of Latter-Day Saints, because of its interest in family origins, has established many Family History Centres amongst its membership throughout the world to assist those members in their own family research. Most family historians are now familiar with the general contents of those centres. This year there has been introduced another dimension to 'Armchair research' - the computer programme called the Family Search. Eight pilot Centres have been chosen and we are one of them.

This programme primarily emphasises cooperative effort amongst ALL researchers so that duplication of effort, time and research is avoided. The hope is that family relationships will be highlighted and cooperative interests combined into a truly wonderful tool to seek out our dead, who were just as important in their own time as we are in ours.

Many people are now using these Centres and being granted facilities which are not easily available elsewhere. By use of the indexes available it is now possible to obtain, via the medium of film, 85% of English Parish Registers, 100% of Census records throughout the British Isles within the limits of law restrictions, monumental inscriptions, parish chest documents, publications of various subject matter, biographies and genealogies.

The contents and resources now available in the FAMILY SEARCH are of two types within six groups.

### 1. Family History Records Management.

This is the personal Ancestral File (PAF) which is a computer software programme which permits input of family data via a menu prompt and the information is then automatically arranged into family groups and pedigree chart relationships.

The PAF allows for information to be fed in and altered where necessary. It is also a powerful sort programme that allows searches for specific names and families even amongst thousands of names.

The PAF will allow patrons to put all their research on floppy disc,

either 5.25 ins or 3.5 ins and then use on another computer or transfer that same information into the Church sponsored programme of Ancestral File.

## 2. Genealogical Research Help.

a) Ancestral File (AF) is a programme on Read Only Memory / Compact Disc. (ROM/CD) and its purpose is to make available family research which others have compiled. It links individuals and families into pedigrees showing ancestors and descendants. Most of the information is about deceased persons. It also gives the names of persons who submitted the file.

It is also hoped that all interested researchers will consider contributing their own research details into the system and so provide the greatest aid to family research in the world. At the moment there are only thirteen and a half million entries on the programme. It is desired that it be as large in breadth as the IGI which now has 184,000,000 entries and is growing by about five million per year.

b) International Genealogical Index / Temple Records Index (IGI). Most people are aware of what is contained on this record and may be a little disappointed that the computer edition is that of 1988 which contains only 143 million entries. However the ROM / CD provides rather more information than the microfiche version so it should not be too frustrating for most.

c) Family History Library catalogue (FHLC) is again mostly familiar to many Family Historians but again there is a further advantage with the CD edition - we can often highlight the actual contents of a source-film by tapping in its number. How many of you have ordered a film and then could not find the particular record which was supposed to be on it? This programme will not only confirm that the particular record is to be found but also what other records may be on the same film; and those other records might not even be in the same locality.

d) The Social Security Death Index (SSDI) is of Americans who have died between 1962 and 1988 who had a Social Security number. It is a record of 39.5 millions and gives birth and death dates, last place of residence, where their death benefit was sent, and their personal security number.

e) Military index of persons who died in Vietnam and Korea between 1950 and 1975. It gives both death and birth dates, identifies home residence at time of enlistment and the country where death took place, rank, serial number, branch of service, the person's tour of duty, religion and marital status.

All of these programmes are provided with the facility to download onto either hard copy - printed A4 sheets, or floppy discs so that personal research can be continued at home. The cost for this service is 5 pence per sheet and £1 for a disc and label. You cannot be allowed to bring your own discs in order to avoid possible corruption by viruses. There is also a warning with each 'download' regarding copyright.

Again we encourage you to contribute into the system. If you wish to submit information into both AF and IGI you will need to send two copies of the data to different departments of the Church. They are not cooperatively matched

because we have to preserve the personal desires and wishes of the Patrons. One programme is for cooperative research purposes with no religious or political bias except friendship. The other is to provide religious blessing to all nations, kindred tongues and people.

We provide these services for your blessing and hope that you will feel a desire to reciprocate. The facility will hopefully be fully available by 1 April 1993.

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### BEATRICE, A VERY BUSY LADY?

The name Beet is said to be derived from Bete, a popular nickname for Beatrice. Beatrice was a common font name in Yorkshire in the thirteenth and fourteenth centuries. If Beatrice had a son, John, he might be known as John Bete or John Beete.

In the United Kingdom today there are only about 220 people named Beet listed in the telephone directories. I know because I wrote to all of them when researching my ancestry! About 25% replied, including descendents of Jonathan Beet of Wortley who was baptised on 28th March 1762.

At first I thought I might be related to Jonathan, but now know that any relationship dates back at the latest to the sixteenth century. Jonathan was apprenticed as a cutler in 1776. He became a Freeman of the Company of Cutlers in 1784 and in the same year married Sarah Smith, daughter of his former master. (Sheffield Parish Church, ref. F/1948/6612).

I believe that the existing Beet Street was named after Jonathan. Certainly in the Sheffield Record Office there are copies of leases relating to land in the region of Upper Allen Street and Broad Lane in 1816 and 1822. In the latter year he agreed to pay an annual rent of £17 8s 10d for an 87 year lease on a dwelling house, warehouse, workshop, smithies and other outhouses.

Jonathan's business prospered and he became a pillar of the Methodist Church. Buried at Carver Street, Sheffield, in 1845, he left two surviving sons, William Jonathan and Thomas. They were trustees of a Wesleyan chapel at Darnall until new trustees were appointed in July 1850. The business continued under the name "Jonathan Beet and Sons" and moved to the newly built Agenoria Works in Savile Street East.

In 1855 Articles of Partnership were drawn up with Henry Peace and Benjamin Schofield. William Jonathan at some time ceased to be actively involved in the business, but was held to be responsible for his share of the debts when it fell into financial difficulties in 1857. He was adjudged bankrupt in 1858 and left Sheffield. His son, Dr. Joseph Agar Beet, (1840-1924), became a well-known

Wesleyan theologian who travelled extensively, lecturing in the USA, and who was Principal of Richmond College.

Joseph Agar Beet had three sons. One of his grandsons, Ernest Agar Beet, is a Fellow of the Royal Astronomical Society and author of a number of books on astronomy.

Jonathan (1762-1845) had several relatives who became involved in cutlery in the Broad Lane area of Sheffield. One of these was a nephew, John. It seems that this John had two sons, John (junior) and William.

William married a widow, Amelia, and converted to the Church of England. He is said to have borrowed £50 from his wife to establish a horn-cutting business. A twentieth century business card has a picture of a large, imposing factory, the "Ceylon Horn Works" Thomas Street and Egerton Lane, Sheffield.

A large family vault is situated in Ecclesall Cemetery. The founder of the business, William, died at the age of 74 in 1895, but his Christian name has continued in use for the five subsequent generations. Samples of cutlery etc. with stag horn handles are still in the possession of family members. Cutting the stag horn could be dangerous as the horn was likely to splinter. William's son, William, is said to have lost two fingers on this way.

William, senior, became very rich, and it is said that he owned most or all of Hanover Square. I am told that he asked the Council to rename the square "Beet Square" but they refused. He may have had an eye for a bargain because it is said that he had delivered to his house on different occasions a lorry-load of second-hand shoes, ten tons of coal and crates of eggs. Be that as it may, subsequent members of this line of Beets have made their mark in life!

What of their ancestors prior to 1762, the year of Jonathan's baptism? That must be left to another article. Whether my own family line and the "Wortley" Beets mentioned above are descended from the same Beatrice is uncertain. Certainly, if all 220 Beets in the U.K. telephone directories shared the same ancestor, Beatrice would have been a very busy lady!

## CRAWSHAWS OF WENTWORTH - A Tale from New Zealand

Although living at Bolton-on-Dearne in the nineteen twenties and thirties - no distance from Wentworth and Elsecar - I knew little or nothing of the Crawshaw family, to which we were related.

My only recollection is of a visit to my parents by Dr 'Jim' Crawshaw, an elderly relation of my mother, about 1935. This stuck in my memory because I was told that he was a ship's doctor travelling to and from New Zealand, and this seemed a rather glamorous occupation.

Many years later, when I became interested in family history, it emerged that my mother's grandfather, Michael Washington, had married Sarah Crawshaw in 1856 at Coley church, near Halifax. Both parties were described in the marriage certificate as residing in nearby Northowram. The certificate named Sarah's father as Joshua Crawshaw and his occupation as 'gamekeeper'. My mother had a framed silhouette of Sarah and recalled that there were Crawshaw graves in Wentworth churchyard.

I still had no knowledge of any living Crawshaws, until a contact in Hoyland kindly put me in touch with two sisters in New Zealand who in turn referred me to their brother Colin Crawshaw, a retired New Zealand dentist - all descended from Sarah's brother James. From the material which he had (James's diary and the family Bible) Colin had compiled a very full and amusing account of the family as he knew it, which he called "The House of Crawshaw".

This, however, could not record anything earlier than the birth dates of Joshua and his wife, and even in relation to later events it was necessarily incomplete. For example, the entry about Sarah mentioned only her date of birth and the fact that in 1856 she had given Northowram as the address from which she sent letters and newspapers to her brother James in Canada. At other times her address was in London. (I still do not know why.)

Joshua Crawshaw, universally known as 'Jossy', who lived from 1797 to 1877, was undoubtedly a 'character'. For a period up to 1859, when he took up farming, he was gamekeeper to Earl Fitzwilliam at Wentworth Woodhouse. Colin Crawshaw gives the following account of his great grandfather's prowess as a shot,

"In the All England pigeon shooting championship Earl Fitzwilliam ...had backed him with the bookmakers to the extent of one thousand guineas. The nobility in those days did not take their wagering lightly. There was one thing which worried the noble Earl - Grandfather Jossy was a bottle a day gin drinker. So, not wishing to 'do his chips cold', His Lordship ordered Jossy onto the 'water waggon'. In spite of G.G.F's protest that he couldn't hit a bird without his eye sharpener, the Earl was adamant. At the practices, much to his Lordship's chagrin, Jossy was definitely off aim. With a small daily allowance of his gin he improved slightly, but it was noticeable that as his allowance increased so did his skill as a marksman! On the day of the match Jossy, now on his full quota, cleaned up all

comers and won a 'packet' for His Lordship at long odds".

Joshua and his wife had no less than twelve children between 1830 and 1853. Only three of these - James, Samuel and Joshua - were boys. James's history is known in some detail, although by no means fully. Samuel grew to adulthood but remained a bachelor; and Colin knew nothing of what happened to the Joshua who was born in 1849. He may have died young.

James, born in 1832, had an adventurous early life, including a five-year period in Canada, with a variety of jobs and much financial hardship. When he returned to England in 1858 this varied pattern continued - surveying, mining, milling, estate valuation, appraisal of crops, valuation of estates and secretarial work. Colin believed that James died in 1879 but this has not yet been confirmed.

James married twice, the second time to his deceased wife's sister, a union not permitted in English law at that period. There were three children but only one son, James Henry Crawshaw, born in 1869, survived into adult life. This was, of course, the 'Dr Jim' who visited Bolton-on-Dearne in the mid-1930's.

James Henry was born at Wath-on-Dearne. During his early years his father must have enjoyed periods of prosperity, as he was sent to Archbishop Holgate's school in York and later began medical studies at University College Hospital, London. Money having run short, he had to interrupt his studies and work for two years as an unqualified assistant to a doctor, but eventually he was able to qualify and set up practice in Elsecar. There he married Phoebe Gertrude Davy and their two boys James Jackson (Jack) Crawshaw and Colin Davy Crawshaw were born there in 1900 and 1902 respectively.

As the Elsecar climate did not suit his wife's health, James Henry decided to emigrate. After a short period in South Africa he settled on New Zealand and sent for his wife and children to join him there. Their two daughters Eileen and Norah were born in New Zealand in 1910 and 1913.

The rest of the story is quickly summarised. James Henry had a very successful medical career in New Zealand, becoming Medical Officer of Health for Otago and Southland. He had to retire from that position because of ill health, and it was then that he took a job as a ship's doctor. He died, however, in 1937.

The Crawshaws have flourished in New Zealand. Jack (a doctor) and Colin have both died in recent years but they and Eileen have all produced children and grandchildren.

As to Jossy's predecessors, I have no real information as yet. The I.G.I. gives a Joshua Crawshaw baptised in 1703 at Hemsworth and another baptised in 1767 at Silkstone. The slightly unusual combination of names suggests that they may have belonged to the same family. I wonder if any relations are still around?
