## PRO NEWS

From 10 March the PRO's Central London Reading Room will be located at the Family Records Centre, Myddleton Street, London EC 1.

**The Family Records Centre, Myddelton Street, London** houses both the Office for National Statistics (ONS) Public Search Room (for indexes etc formerly kept at St. Catherine's House) and the Public Record Office Census & Wills Reading Rooms (formerly at Chancery Lane). It is near to the Society of Genealogists and the London Metropolitan Archives.

The Family Records Centre will provide larger reading rooms and better furniture and equipment. There will be a bigger cloakroom and refreshment areas where readers will be able to consume their own food and drink, or use the vending machines selling drinks and snacks. The new centre has a family history reference area, including books, maps and CD ROMs. Refreshment facilities are also available. There will also be access from here to the Scottish On-Line link (a booking system is being used and there is a fee payable too.)

Extended opening hours at the **Public Record Office in Kew** have now taken effect, to bring them more in to line with the FRC:

Monday to Friday the hours are the same as for the FRC. Last orders for documents at 4.10 p.m.

Saturdays 9.30 - 5.00 from 5 July 1997 (last orders for documents at noon).

There is a restaurant, although on Saturdays it will only sell snacks.

The two week stock taking closure will now be in the first two full weeks of December, instead of early October.

There will be a **one day conference** for those who are new to the records at Kew on Monday 14 July. The programme includes how to use the facilities and insights into the records and how to use them. The fee is £15, or £10 concessions. ### **Look Us Up!**

The computerised index to WO 97 is now available in the Microfilm Reading Room. This class of records is the main series of service documents for soldiers (but not officers), who became pensioners of the Royal Hospital Chelsea, between 1760 and 1913. Although indexes to other classes of records are available for consultation, WO 97 is the first one to be made available on-line in the Reading Rooms.

The index itself was created by the Friends of the PRO over a period of about 5 years. Unlike the printed version, which is only available in surname order, the automated version can be searched on name, regiment and county/country of birth. On entry to the system, you will be able to select one or more of the search parameters to view the document references that match your criteria. Screen help and messages are available to assist your searches.

Many soldiers served in more than one regiment and sometimes used an alias. Another benefit of the new system is that these associated regiments and names will be displayed on the screen along with the document reference. Once the references are displayed, note them down and take a look at the relevant microfilm, in the Microfilm Reading Room, to get more details of the soldiers' discharge papers. Information usually includes age, birthplace, service (including any decorations), occupation on enlistment and the reason given for discharge to pension.

## SOCIETY MEETINGS

*Meeting on Monday 20 January 1997*

### **Sheffield Theatres**

Martin Olive began his talk by acknowledging all the work done by voluntary local history researchers. Their work added and continues to add to the total amount of local-knowledge.

He next spoke of a large collection (about 3500) of PLAYBILLS wrapped in brown paper parcels, many very fragile, deposited in the Local Studies Library by a 'Mr Wilkinson'.

The medieval and later times saw travelling players and acrobats, etc. attracted to fairs and castles. In the 16th century, the Earls of Shrewsbury would have entertained his guests with such players. People visiting Sheffield's two annual fairs would have been similarly entertained. Although greatly enjoyed by all, both aristocrats and commons, players were often considered 'rogues and vagabonds', and ordered to 'move on'.

In the 18th century, the Angel Inn Yard in Angel Street, Sheffield, was often the venue for concerts and balls. Martin showed a slide of a playbill for such an event in 1761, but the prices (2 sh. for the pit and 1 sh. for the gallery) clearly meant that only the rich could attend. The following year (1762) the Assembly Rooms and a Theatre (later the Theatre Royal) was opened on Norfolk Street, then on the edge of town. This establishment consisted of tea and card rooms and a Ballroom as well as a Theatre. A playbill from 1782 showed a typical programme with a tragedy and a farce, with shorter acts between. By 1794 The Theatre Royal had been rebuilt twice, and was beginning to attract an 'unruly element', mostly cutlers-it seems, who threw such things as fish heads and bricks into the pit from the balcony.

Social unrest caused by the French Revolution continued into the early 19th century. By the 1820s theatres were criticised, especially by religious leaders. In 1825 Sheffield's middle classes opened the Music Hall on Surrey Street as an alternative attraction. Martin showed playbills for Concerts, panoramas, wax works and freak shows. Tom Thumb visited Sheffield in September 1857. The Botanical Gardens were the venue for pantomimes, Gala Days, bandstand, bear pits, soirees and fireworks. Circuses, such as Ducrow's, were housed in temporary booths on building sites. In 1831 a Chinese Pagoda appeared in Corn Market.

Pantomimes became increasingly popular from the 1850s onwards. Martin showed playbills for 'Bluebeard' (Adelphi), 'Sindbad the Sailor' (The Royal), 'Golden Goose' (Hippodrome 1913), 'Aladdin' (Lyceum 1905).

The City Theatre (1890) was damaged by fire in 1897 and was refurbished. It reopened as the Lyceum. The Empire Palace staged high standard Music Hall with top stars. The later 1890s saw a concentration of so called 'theatres' or 'smoking rooms' on West Bar, usually behind public/beer houses, but many were eventually closed down because of stricter fire regulations. Mr Youdan ran a number of establishments including the Surrey Theatre (Shakespeare, London West End melodrama, burnt down 1865) and the Alexandra Opera House (previously the Adelphi) for Drama and Music. The Adelphi had developed from the Circus, and the playbills had wood engravings of equestrians, other artistes and animals. Up to the 1st World War it showed popular melodrama, with authentic costumes (eg Mr Woo, Scarlet Pimpernel). Souvenirs became very popular in the early 20th century: photographs of such artists as Ellaline Terris, Florrie Forde, Ellen Terry and Vesta Tilly.

The suburbs of Sheffield also had their theatres, especially Attercliffe. The Alhambra, during the 20th century, was at various times a variety venue, a cinema and a music hall, but closed during the 1950s, the fate of many other similar establishments.

The fortunes of Sheffield's theatres have been mixed: the Alexandra was demolished; the Theatre Royal showed Variety in the 1920s, but burnt down in 1935; the Empire did Variety and Big Bands, also burnt down in 1958. The Lyceum went through various uses: plays, Bingo, Pop Venue, but has been recently restored.

Amateur dramatics and operatics have been very popular in Sheffield since the 1920s.

## **Entertainment tokens**

Further to Mr Olive's talk on Sheffield Theatres a member, who wishes to remain anonymous, has written about two tokens in their possession connected with the entertainment industry of Sheffield.

One is for the Surrey Theatre, West Bar. Although much worn the obverse shows the front of a building with a pitched roof. As there is no sign of the later tower, Mr Olive thinks this shows the early theatre, c. 1850. The reverse has T. YUDAN PROMENADE SHEFFIELD. It has a milled edge, is about the size of the old penny, and has a brassy appearance. These tokens or

checks were bought as one entered the theatre, and entitled the customer to a number of drinks.

The second token is superior in appearance, being for the Botanical Gardens. It again has a milled edge, but is heavier and slightly thicker, and is a copper colour. Blank on one side, the other has BOTANICAL GARDENS SHEFFIELD around a shield carrying crossed arrows. These were used for entrance to the Galas which were held in the Gardens when in private ownership as Mr Olive described in his talk.

### **Some Secondary Sources for Family Historians**

In his talk, illustrated with colour slides, Roy Bullen described some of the lesser-used sources which can help us in our research. He suggested primary sources were parish registers, census records, civil registration certificates, wills and other original documents held by one's family.

His secondary sources (illustrated, and with examples from his own delving) included names from church pew rentals, inscriptions on church bells, canal waterman's log books, Sunday School attendance lists, Almshouse records, inferences from the government "Abstract of Statistics" relating to occupations in the 19th century census returns and notes sometimes appended by enumerators to indicate reasons for changes in population (e.g. by emigration). Other examples were given and, to close, the speaker gave in some detail what could be learned from maimed soldiers' petitions for annuities (c 1660-1695) and how one family could be traced as tenants over five generations between 1730 and 1790 by interpretation of manorial court rolls.

## **Reports from Officers**

### ***Chairman's Report:***

I must admit to feeling a little sad to be delivering my last report as Chairman of the Society, but have no fear, I am not going very far, and will always be willing to help when asked to do so. This report, following so closely after my letter in the Spring Issue of "The Flowing Stream", need only be brief. The Society is a large one and, fortunately, enthusiastic new volunteers have appeared to take over the positions which have become vacant on the Committee. I am grateful for this and hope that these members will receive satisfaction and pleasure from their efforts. To offer my personal thanks to a selected few at this time would be discourteous to the many members who have helped me over the years. All I would say is that if you have helped me at all, be it in a large or small way, then you know that I am saluting you all now, as I could not have performed my duties alone. I must, however, make one exception and that is to thank our retiring Secretary for his dedication, friendship and support. Roy Bullen was asked to take office at a time when the Society was going through a bad spell. His expertise in committee work and family history matters saved the day and it has been my pleasure to work alongside him.

I wish the Society a very happy and progressive future, and trust you will continue to give your enthusiastic support to your new Committee and officers.

### ***Treasurer's Report***

In presenting the Society's accounts for 1996 I would like to make the following points:

- Included in the rather large sum for room hire is an amount carried over from 1995. The charge for the large hall at Cemetery Road Baptist Church will increase from £25 to £31, and for the small Committee Meeting Room from £4.50 (at the Ancient Order of Foresters rooms which are no longer available) to £12.50 at the Baptist Church.
- Half way through the year, the Committee suggested various changes to the accounting system. For 1996, journal postage has been shown separately from general postage. Other changes, including the separation of general postage and telephone calls, will be made in 1997.
- Our bankers (Lloyds) insisted that our account should be changed to one making a limit of 10 uncharged cheques per month, counted on the day of

encashment, over which, of course, we have no control. Any cheques over this limit will be charged at £2 each. Repeated complaints have been ignored. One way of coping with this problem has been the instigation of a petty cash system.

Our Australian agency, begun in January 1996, is now running satisfactorily. We are indebted to Mr John Orange and Mr Dennis Hook, two of our Australian members, for their invaluable contribution to the success of this system, and we thank them heartily.

Finally I thank Mr G Lyon, the auditor, for his usual speedy and efficient service, and all the members who had renewed their membership for 1997 so promptly and efficiently.

The Accounts were approved on a proposal by Angela Kendrick, seconded by Les Gilberthorpe.

### *Secretary's Report*

Your Committee was weakened during the year by the sad death of Eric Cox, which was mentioned in "The Flowing Stream" last summer. As usual there were five Committee meetings during the year with average attendance of between 12 and 13 of our 17 members. Our use of the Order of Foresters meeting room in Trippet Lane ended when they moved to Leeds. We now meet in a comfortable room at Cemetery Road Baptist Church.

A very satisfactory situation has been reached by the virtual completion of the 1861 Census surname index for Sheffield. This project has been spread over several years and has caused the Committee some headaches, but thanks to the new energy of our volunteer transcribers and producers, we can see the whole project being published before very long. It should be a matter of some pride that the Society (never forgetting the mammoth early contribution of our dear friend, the late Ted Shortland) has indexed every possible Census from 1841 to 1881. And through our arrangement with the Mormon Church authorities these records can be seen by genealogists worldwide at Family History Centres near their own homes.

I advised attenders at last year's AGM that there would be Committee posts becoming vacant this year, and so there are. Members attending our monthly meetings have known for well over a year that our Chairman, Marjorie Dunn, and myself were intending to vacate our offices. For some months recently, the Committee were rather anxiously exercising their minds over the future composition of our panel of four senior officers. I am glad to report that this possible difficulty has been resolved by two ladies accepting nomination for office. We are confident that the two Js (Jo and Judith) will take our Society forward in a purposeful way, and perhaps break new ground as our

### THE LITTLE RED BOOK

Chairman Mao had one and maybe there are many others, but none can compare with Auntie Kate's. She was my mother's sister, fourteen years older and born in 1889 in Walkley and married Arthur in 1914, six weeks before he joined the army. She lived through two world wars and died in 1970. Uncle Arthur owned and ran the blacksmith's shop in Wadsley Bridge until 1946. Many local people still have fond memories of Auntie Kate. I have a large collection of photographs, her mother's Bible with family details, two newspaper cuttings of their obituaries, all the receipts of the items she bought to set up their first home from black lead brushes at 4½d, through "a chamber service" for the bedroom at 18s 6d to a second hand piano for £30 0s 0d from Uncle Charlie. And of course, the little Red Book.

In 1920, Kate and Arthur moved to Birley Carr where they spent the rest of their lives and the little Red Book is a combined I.G.I. cum Census of the village and its surroundings centred on the Chapel.

It measures 5¼" x 3" and started life as an Address Book. The date beside her name and address inside the cover is 1935 and the last dated entry is 1969, one year before she died at the age of 81. The first page, A, starts with birthdays in January but, by the time we get to March on page 3 we are instructed to go to L for more birthdays in February. Add all the marriages and deaths of nearly 800 people that are recorded and glorious confusion reigns from page 5 onwards. It does mean that when looking for a name every page has to be read and gradually the contents become familiar. When I first started my family research and discovered my maternal grandmother Ellen was a Brown, then the unknown Uncle Arthur and Auntie Polly dropped into place. Unfortunately quite a number of Kate's close relatives are entered as Arthur's Father or Uncle Fred, no surnames or even Christian names. Grandmother Ellen married twice and her second husband was known throughout the family as Pa Taylor and his Christian name is unknown and never mentioned nor the date of their wedding. I think he was a retired miner and lived by the canal at Kilnhirst before moving to Rawmarsh. All the names entered seem more interesting - Lizzie Whittle, Ezra Nutt, Amanda, Rispah, Laura, Ewart, Willis, Eunice, Bertha, Lollie Wastnage - whatever is Lollie short for? - not a Kylie to be seen.

In amongst all the names and dates, liberally scattered with quotation marks and brackets, is information that Kate found essential and interesting so

that the little Red Book also became part diary and part encyclopaedia. There is a selection of boarding houses in Bridlington, Blackpool and Scarborough with comments on who stayed there and how much - Lily Jane 12/6 - On the Front 4/6 per night - Mabel Bullas's 8/-. She and Arthur preserved - "put down" seven dozen eggs in waterglass in June 1940 and I can still remember the large bread crock they used and kept in the garden shed. These eggs I suspect, were taken in part payment for shoeing horses in the early days of rationing as were the occasional pieces of pork that found their way onto the Sunday dinner table accompanied by apple sauce from food parcels sent by relatives in Canada and America, all of whom are listed in the book.

I know how many rolls of wallpaper are needed for the parlour and back bedroom, how much her new corsets cost, when she went into the Royal Infirmary for the "major operation". There are knitting patterns for socks for soldiers, helmets, my socks aged seven and a woolly vest, X.O.S, Auntie Kate being very well built, with how many rows for the "front". Such words as bust were never mentioned. I've found recipes for "Sciatic" and one for Asthma containing "2 oz Olive Oil, 2 oz of Marsh Melia, put into a 8 oz bottle and fill up with sherry!" and how to get from Sheffield to Blackpool by road to see Arthur's sister Bertha. They went in the Flying Standard 9 that they had bought on the 29th May 1939. Arthur passed his driving test on the 7th of September. "Near side of a car or horse is at your left hand".

The "In Memorium" quotations are very touching and sentimental; but Aunt Kate's information is all embracing-. how to write asking, in the politest terms to vacate the lock-up garage, replying to a wedding invitation and thanking someone for their gift and best wishes; the official numbers killed and wounded in the blitz of Sheffield, 13th December 1940. All her pets are included in the birthdays, "Tibby, my cat, September 4th", "Punch, the dalmatian, (my dog), September 20th" and who but the closest family would know that the next entry, Sally Cocker, was a relative and not a spaniel!

Arthur was awarded the Military Medal in 1918 for rescuing a comrade from No Man's-Land and at some stage of the war was gassed but only slightly. That and the smoke from fitting horses' shoes and Woodbines eventually caught up with him and he went into the Infirmary on the 26th January 1946 with respiratory problems and came home on the 28th February "Mother's birthday, bitter cold day it was". By June they had sold the shop and business for £1,250, Arthur was 60 years old and lived until 1964. Wonderful people, eternal memories and all in the little Red Book.

## DIARY OF LEONARD PARKIN (contd.)

### **Tuesday 30 May 1882**

A very hot morning. The sea is very calm and very little wind. Games for the children this afternoon and sweets given to all the young folk by the Captain. 86 miles.

### **Wednesday 31 May 1882**

Nice clear morning with a calm sea. At 4.30 this afternoon we passed Port Santo Island. It was a beautiful sight. A tremendous height above the sea and the first bit of land since we left England. A concert in the single women's quarters tonight. 189 miles.

### **Thursday 1 June 1882**

Nice sunshiny morning with a calm sea but a good wind in our favour and we are moving along at a fair pace. A concert tonight in the married peoples' quarters. The Captain and first mate were present. A very enjoyable night. 189 miles.

### **Friday 2 June 1882**

Very calm this morning. Very calm sea. At 9am we sighted Canary. We sailed within a mile of it about two in the afternoon we saw an American ship that had been wrecked. She was loaded with timber. Our Captain ordered the life boats to be manned and we steered towards the wreck but when we came close to her there were no signs of life on her decks. The vessel was covered with sea weed. All her masts were splintered to match-wood. She had been a wooden vessel and loaded with timber. It was impossible to sink so we passed on. The Captain said it might float about for months unless some steamer sees it and tows it into some Port. 74 miles.

### **Saturday 3 June 1882**

Sunshiny this morning. Sea very calm and no wind. We passed another island but did not get the name of it. 56 miles.

### **Sunday 4 June 1882**

A nice morning. Sun shining. A good Wind blowing in our favour. There were two services aboard today. One at 3pm and the other at 7.15. Conducted by the Captain. 124 miles.

### **Monday 5 June 1882**

Fine morning and very warm. The sea is calm but a fair wind blowing. Plenty of star-fish all round the ship. Games for the children after dinner. 160 miles.

**Tuesday 6 June 1882**

Very hot this morning and a fair wind blowing. After dinner we had a very heavy down-pour of rain but it only lasted about an hour. We are now in the tropics and the sun is very hot. 195 miles.

**Wednesday 7 June 1882**

Hot again this morning but a fair wind in our favour. Clouds of flying fish about. They seem to fly 40 to 50 feet in the air and then dive straight down into the sea. About 8 in the evening there were lots of men-of-war fish all round the ship. 168 miles.

**Thursday 8 June 1882**

A clear morning. Good wind blowing. Plenty of flying fish. The sailors have been employed a month today. This is their first pay. They get £3 for the first month then no more till they get into port This is what they call the "Dead Horse" and as soon as dinner was finished a dummy horse was made out of timber and old bags. It was mounted on wheels with a dummy rider. The rider was a full sized man with a beard 18 inches long. The horse and the rider were pulled round the ship three times while the sailors sang something about the poor old horse. Then the horse and rider were put up for auction. The bidding went up to a pound but was knocked down to the Captain. Then the horse and rider were drawn up into the rigging and swung about 20 feet clear of the boat and by some means (known only to the sailors) the horse and rider burst into flames, the rope was cut, the horse and rider fell into the sea. We could see it burning for nearly an hour, then the sailors finished the night with singing three cheers for the dead horse. 150 miles.

**Friday 9 June 1882**

Beautiful morning, sun very hot, plenty of fish all around the ship. 152 miles.

**Saturday 10 June 1882**

A nice morning with smooth sea, but a fair wind blowing. Just after dinner we saw two whales within a few hundred yards from us. They seemed to be about 40 feet long, just swimming very slowly and throwing streams of water in the air. 153 miles.

**Sunday 11 June 1882**

Sunshiny and very hot, plenty of flying fish. One came down on the deck and could not rise - it was about 18 inches long. We had two services, one at three and one at 7.15. First mate at three, Captain at 7.15. 144 miles

**Monday 12 June 1882**

Raining this morning, a good wind blowing, we are moving along, not much to be seen on account of the rain, too heavy for us to go on deck. 176 miles.

**13 June 1882**

A clear morning with a good wind in our favour. A little girl 18 months old died during the night, she had been ill only a few days. She was buried at 10.30am. 176 miles.

**Wednesday 14 June 1882**

A nice morning and a good breeze in our favour. We saw another sailing ship at 2 o'clock in the afternoon about 2 miles away. This was the first ship we have seen since leaving Plymouth and everybody seemed to be excited. I suppose they would be the same if they saw us. 172 miles.

**Thursday 15 June 1882**

Nice clear morning with a good wind blowing. About 10am we saw 3 sailing ships and they were in sight all day. 161 miles.

**Friday 16 June 1882**

Not too bright this morning but there is a good wind blowing. We passed St Paul's Island at 10am - it is only a small barren island. In the afternoon we saw a large black fish - almost as big as a whale. We crossed the line about 3.30pm. 210 miles.

**Saturday 17 June 1882**

Very dull this morning but we are moving along very nicely with a good wind behind us. A son was born this morning to Mrs Cotteral, both doing well. We had heavy rain in the afternoon. 148 miles.

**Sunday 18 June 1882**

A lovely morning, sun very hot, not a ripple on the water. About 11am we had a very heavy shower lasting about an hour, then the wind got up and we began to move a little faster. We had two services, one on the afterdeck at 3pm, the other at 7.15. All the Sunday services are well attended. Plenty of good singing. 109 miles.

**Monday 19 June 1882**

Sun very hot this morning. Sea very calm with a fair wind blowing. At 10am we saw 3 sailing ships, all going the same way as ourselves, One of them left Cardiff a fortnight before us - she was bound for Queensland, the other two we could not get a message from them as a shower of rain came and stopped the signalling. 124 miles.

**Tuesday 20 June 1882**

Very heavy rain this morning, impossible to stay on deck. It cleared after dinner. About 4 o'clock a large steamer - going in the opposite direction to us, passed us about three miles away. At 7.30 we had singing and music in our own quarters. 110 miles.
