Cost of service

The fee is £1 for each surname for members of the Sheffield and District FHS. For non-members the fee is £3 per surname. If you require variants of the surname then the fee is £1 for each variant that you state. Please do not expect us to think of the variants for you.

If you require a search for a common surname e.g. Green then you are advised to provide the forename(s) if possible. (This is to limit the cost to you – there are 25 pages of entries with the surname Green in the Census index)

You will receive a print-out of the surname you requested up to a maximum of 5 pages. If the search should produce more than that then you will be notified with the first part of the return.

How to order

If you wish, photocopy the order form to be found in the centre pages or write the details clearly on a piece of paper and sent it to the person providing the service. If you are a member of the Society please state your membership number – without it you will be charged at the higher rate. Please enclose a large stamped self addressed envelope, at least DL (110mm by 220mm). For more than one surname search please enclose an extra 20p stamp per name to cover postage.

ON THE ROAD

The Society had a stall at the WYAS event in Halifax in September. It was not as well attended as the event in Bradford the previous year, but it was good to meet local members and for them to see the extent of our wares.

Doncaster Family History Day School, 31st October 1998

This was an interesting day. We had a stall and met members who do not usually manage to travel to the meetings in Sheffield and Rotherham. There were also four talks, all very interesting and different.

Anne Batchelor started the day with 'My name is Frances', the story of her mother's life. She had intended to delve into her family history before the 20th century, but has found her mother's life quite compelling. Her diligence and detective work should be held up as an example to all.

Lizzie Jones then portrayed herself as Elizabeth Cromwell, wife of Oliver, and brought her very much to life. Any ideas we had that Puritans wore black with large white collars were quickly dispelled as she explained that the Puritans dressed according to their class, not their religion. The vast majority of Puritans were middle class and that was the garb of the middle classes. The women wore all colours – not just black – and also wore jewellery. Interestingly, black was a colour that indicated wealth because the dye was more expensive.

Ian Dewhurst then entertained us with the happenings in the Keighley workhouse. All of the Workhouse records are held at the Local library, and the tales of the reluctance of the Board of Guardians to modernise the Poor Law provision had to be heard to be believed. The underlying squalor was heartbreaking.

Lizzie Jones then rounded off the proceedings with *A Gradely Yuletide*, Oliver Cromwell's attempt to eradicate the Christmas celebrations.

HOT OFF THE PRESS

The which? census

Some time ago three friends were looking through the catalogue in Sheffield Archives and saw an entry for the 1831 Census for Nether Hallam. Being curious they asked to see it and were delighted to find that it was a listing of over 900 households in Nether Hallam. They subsequently transcribed the names and locations of the people on the list and handed it to me to be published by the society. I too was curious to see the original document and went to Archives. The full listing gave the name of the householder (only), the number of males and females in the household and the number of males of 20 years or more in the house at the time (31st May 1831). It also lists the occupations of those males. As you may expect, many of the occupations are to do with the cutlery industry, from saw manufacturers through to razor grinders and the ancillary industries such as paper manufacture. I have added the occupations and the numbers of people in each household, so that this is a transcription of the original. The areas (original spellings) covered in this census along with the number of entries for each, are:

Broad Lane (3), Brook Hill (6), Centrefield (155), Cloughfield (14), Crooks (46), Crooksmoor (26), Edcliffe Grange (5), Endcliffe (5), Gatefields (49), Gell Street (11), Glossop Road (5), Heely (2), Heeley Nether (60), Heeley Upper (118), Hill Bridge (24), Hillfoot (86), Leavygreave (3), Lidgate (32), Malin Bridge (6), Nether Slack (6), Owlerton (73), Philadelphia (61), Portmahon (11), Rolling Hill (5), Steel Bank (19), Toll Bar (17), Upper Slack (2), Uppertorpe (37), Walkley (53)

IN THE PIPELINE

Burial transcriptions – update

The transcribing of Ecclesall All Saints records has reminded me of the importance of checking all variants of any names which we are researching.

In the records from 1813 to 1818 the following spellings appear

Woodhouse – Wooddous – Woodous

Clarke – Clarc – Clarkck – Clarcke

Daws – Dause – Daues – Daus

Ellewel – Elowel – Helliwell

Dungworth – Dongworth

Young – Younge - Yongue

Other spellings – Hoele (Hoole?) – Rag (Wragg?) - Nuton (Newton?) – Foard

(Ford?) – Iginbottam (Higinbottom?) – Craushaw (Crawshaw?)

There are often double letters such as in Bisshop, Willson

I have just come across one my family names (Andrew) with an H in front. Forenames are very often spelt phonetically as are some of the occupations.

The burials from 1815 to 1818 were copied from one register to the beginning of another register, resulting in 45 entries being wrongly transcribed. We have entered all of these twice, showing both spellings.

Transcriptions completed

St Peter and St Paul 1813 to 1855 - St James 1813 to 1855 - St Paul 1813 to 1855

In production

St Mary (Bramall Lane) - Ecclesall All Saints - St John (Park) - All Saints (Rotherham) - St Mary (Greasbrough) – Christ Church Heeley.

NB these are all full transcriptions and not just indexes.

At present, there are 82,000 burial records available to be searched. This number is growing all the time.

Do you have a fiche reader and some time to spare? Although 29 of our volunteers have fiche readers, we could still do with more. Each fiche has to go through four different processes, three of which need a fiche reader.

This website went live on Monday 18th January, and the Sheffield and District FHS is one of the societies with a permanent stall. You may buy the goods, membership and searches offered by using credit card or cheques. The obvious advantages of using credit cards (encrypted for security) are that you can buy the goods in £ Sterling but pay in your local currency, avoiding the bank charges that can exceed the cost of the goods.

You may notice that some of the prices offered on the website do differ from the ones in the Society Publications lists. This is because we have to pay commission for all of the products, and the difference is effectively the cost of the credit card facility. We hope that the difference will be lower than the cost of purchasing £ Sterling cheques and that this service will be acceptable to our members.

I will be interested to hear your views on this – covering everything from the colours used to the goods offered for sale.

Alfred Binney had been a lifelong friend of my father's since schooldays. They grew up together in and about the Walkley area of Sheffield. Alfred Binney, after doing an apprenticeship to be a joiner followed in his father's footsteps and became a newsagent eventually owning two shops in Barber road, Walkley. One, the "top shop", was managed by his wife **Vera (nee Slowe)** whilst he managed the other at the tram stop on the corner of Barber Road and Crookesmoor Road.

The papers are a readymade 3 generation research of the Binneys – to someone. As I am researching my own family I realised that the papers just might be a link for someone in the area. There are birth/ marriage/ death certificates of Austin Oswald and Alfred Binney as well as certificates for Vera's parents, the Slowes.

Sheffield High School*

I read all the "Flowing Streams" with interest as, I am sure, do most members. In the Winter 1988 edition is an article by Michael Bunting which contains information which may confuse readers whose family attended the Sheffield High School. He refers to the Girls' High School by which name the school is commonly called.

I started there as a 11 year old in 1942 and left in 1949. The headmistress in 1942 was Miss Macauley, not Miss McLellan. The school did not close during the war. The senior school was evacuated to Cliffe College, Carver, but the Junior School remained in Rutland Park off Clarkehouse Road next door to the main school building. Miss Hamilton was head of the Junior School. We shared our netball courts with the soldiers who occupied the main school building. They did their drill and in turn we played netball. We could watch the men drilled when we were bored by our lessons!

We could not play hockey on our hockey pitch out at Crosspool because the troops learnt to ride their motorbikes on the field and anyway there were no air raid shelters at the playing fields. The 5-10 year olds were all in Sheffield, the 14-18 year olds were all at Cliffe College. There were equal numbers of 11-13 year old in Sheffield and in Cliffe College. We could not play tennis at the school because the tennis courts had been bombed, so arrangements were made for us to go to the nearby University tennis courts. We went to the gymnasium

at the King Edward's Junior School gym, and also had swimming lessons at King Edward's where we walked in a crocodile.

In 1945, we returned to the main school building, leaving just the prep department in the junior school building. A lot of adjustments had to be made by everybody, staff and pupils alike. As the troops had worn their boots in the building the floors had to be sanded and the staircases repaired. Only the library had been kept locked, so protecting it from damage.

If anyone wants to know more about education in 1939-45, including Home Service, then I would be willing to tell more.

SOCIETY MEETINGS

Meeting on Monday 21 September 1998

Victorian Working Class Housing

Susan Deal of the Victorian Society gave a detailed account of the different types of housing built in the north of England during the 19th century. The century was a time of rapidly increasing population and the Industrial Revolution created a demand for workers in the various northern towns. To house these workers and to cope with the rapidly increasing population of the country many new small houses were built in towns such as Sheffield and Leeds. We were shown many examples of the different types of low cost (and often low quality) houses built, usually in terraces and often back to back, to provide cheap living accommodation for large numbers of people in a small area.

Meeting on Monday 19th October 1998

The Mayflower Pilgrims in England, Holland and America

Malcolm Dolby's talk emphasised the beginning of the story – why the Puritans were persecuted and why they went to Holland and America. For some people the English Reformation had not gone far enough in terms of purifying the Church of England of the Papist practices, and a radical movement began in around 1570 at Cambridge University. These Puritans should not be confused with the later 17th century variety.

Their beliefs included the reorganisation of the Church administration along Calvinist lines (ie to dispose of the bishops and the church hierarchy), to be allowed to compose their own prayers and to dispose of clerical vestments. Some churches did adopt some of these practices, and they were not disturbed until after 1603 when the Presbyterian James I ascended the throne. The English bishops convinced James that the Puritans were a threat to him and he responded accordingly – the Puritans then met secretly.

Some of the graduates from Cambridge University moved to parishes in the Lincolnshire area, and the talk detailed the growth of the Puritan beliefs in the area, culminating in a group of Puritans fleeing to Holland in 1608.

The English Puritans joined a church in Leyden in the Low Country, where they lived for a few years. By 1616 -17 some wished to return to England and did so. Others moved within Holland, aware that the Spanish influence could have an effect on their freedom of worship. Some decided to try to obtain permission from James to settle in Virginia in the New World. James gave them the necessary licence, they pooled their resources and bought a boat, *Speedwell*. They negotiated with a London syndicate to underwrite the voyage and to organise support, and entered in to a seven year agreement for trading with the syndicate. The syndicate hired the *Mayflower*.

In 1620 *Speedwell* left the Low Countries with the intention of crossing the Channel and met *Mayflower* at Southampton. They then left for America, but 100 miles beyond Land's End *Speedwell* started to ship water, so both boats returned to Plymouth. *Mayflower* subsequently made the crossing alone; on reaching the coast of the New World the captain steered them north of Virginia and they landed in Cape Cod, where His Majesty had no jurisdiction whatsoever.

The details of the settlement are recorded in William Bradford's book (1630) and the yearly diary he kept until 1642. The appendix recorded the names of the passengers of the *Mayflower* and what happened to them in their new settlement. Without this their names would not have been known.

Meeting on Monday 16 Nov. 1998

Conservation advice

Teresa Januszonok from the Sheffield Archives Conservation Unit gave invaluable advice to members on the conservation of their precious heirlooms. The items brought along by members elicited the following advice:

The embroidered tissue paper 'clothes' made for a doll by Jo Rundle's mother about 1900 should be kept in a polyester sleeve.

Textiles should be stored in acid free wrapping paper and an archival box.

A precious book should be put into a cruciform book box that fits the book.

Linen, well washed in mild soap, is a good wrapping medium for books.

All precious books should be stored flat and direct sunlight and heat should be avoided.

Re-photocopy material from time to time as the paper used is recycled.

Avoid sellotape.

Use a B pencil to identify documents.

Do NOT iron documents.

Keep photos in polyester sleeves, not in polythene envelopes.

Photocopying photographs causes them to fade.

Modern colour photographs do not have stable colours. The only stable photos are black and white ones.

OTHER PEOPLE'S PROBLEMS

Doreen Irlam, 3A, Ashkirk Street, Gorton, Manchester M18 requires details on **Thomas Hinchliffe** and **Ann Belk**. Son **John** was born 26 Jan. 1838. Address given was Hicks Lane. There is no trace in the census.

Jennifer M. Higgins, 5, Slaidburn Avenue, Chapeltown, Sheffield S35 2EN writes: "Can anyone help me to locate my great grandmother's natural parents? She was born **Charlotte Kenworthy** (illegitimate) in Chapeltown / Ecclesfield around 1837 (census for 71 / 81). On her children's birth certificates she gives 'formerly **Lambert**' the usual form for maiden names. She was so attached to the name that she gave it as a second Christian name to her son and grandson, both **George Lambert**.

She was married at St. John's, Park, in 1864, to **George Brailsford**, a labourer from Stretton, Derbyshire. He rose in the steel works to melter and they subsequently lived at Woodhouse 1865, Bramall Lane 1871 and finally at 18, Colver Road. There was money from somewhere; at least two of their sons went to Barnsley Grammar School and one, **William**, became an estate agent and Land Agent in Pinstone Street.

Does anyone know if the records from Barnsley Grammar School survive before 1910, when it moved campus and became Holgate Grammar? I cannot trace them 1880-1890.

I have circumstantial evidence that Charlotte could have been connected to the Kenworthy family of Bitholmes Quarry and Henholmes Farm at Deepcar. Members of the family had lived and worked in Stretton circa 1825 and subsequently called a family home in Stocksbridge, Stretton Villa, so there is a connection with George's birthplace.

I have not been able to trace a Lambert family with a daughter of Charlotte's age either in Stretton, or Chapeltown, Ecclesfield or Barnsley. Any help or ideas appreciated."

Jan Morgan, 20, Craig Place, Alexandra, Central Otago, New Zealand writes: "I am seeking information about the movements of **Joshua Crookes Undy** between 1895 and 1905. Joshua was born 4 April 1881 at Bolsover St. Sheffield to **Emma Undy** and **Hugh Crookes**. There were 13 children born to Emma and Hugh between 1876 and 1900, some using the surname Undy and some using Crookes. It appears that some of the children emigrated to Canada. Did Joshua Crookes Undy stay in England or emigrate, possibly to New Zealand? Any help appreciated."

"Information sought on **John Smith** and family living in Wombwell in the 1881 census. They were originally from Norfolk. **Pleasance** (John's wife) died in

1883 at the South Yorkshire asylum. Did John re-marry? And what happened to their daughters **Edith** c 1866, **Florence** c1868 and **Sarah Jane** c 1874? I have a photo of two elderly ladies (sisters?). the only information on the back reads Tyzack Rd. Sheffield 1937. The ladies could possibly be related to the **Harrold**, **Cook**, **Smith**, **Goy** or **Goodrum** families. Any information appreciated."

"Information sought on **John Ponsonby**, born 26 May 1862 in Union Workhouse, Sheffield to **John Ponsonby**, blacksmith journeyman and **Ellen Ponsonby**, formerly **Kayann**. The birth was registered by James Wescoe, Workhouse Master, on 27 June 1862. Has anyone come across this family in the Sheffield area around 1862, or anywhere on the 1861 census? John Ponsonby senior could be my long lost ancestor who died in Southampton in 1868. He was also known as **John Punch** of **John Punchaby**. The later family were Roman Catholic. All Ponsonby or Punchaby information welcomed. Sheffield Archives have confirmed the identity of the Workhouse Master but John junior's baptism or the family in 1861 have not been found in Sheffield."

" **Charles** and **Eliza Cole** (nee **Renyard**) were married in Dorset in 1883 and then moved to Hampshire where my Grandmother **Elizabeth Emma** was born in 1899. They then appear to have moved to Sheffield between 1899 and 1906 when their daughter Elizabeth Emma gave birth to a son, **Edward**, whilst living at 11, Bailey Street. In 1912, their son, **Ernest Frederick** was living at 17, Bailey Street. Elizabeth Emma lived the rest of her life in Sheffield. I have no further information regarding Charles and Eliza and would appreciate any help. **Herbert** and **Fanny Boulding** (nee **Murphy**) were married in Sheffield at St. Matthew's Church in 1871, at which time Fanny was living in Rockingham Street. We know where Herbert was born but have been unable to trace where and when Fanny was born although the 1881 census states that she was born in Sheffield and was 27 at the time of the census. We have checked the St. Catherine's records to no avail and would appreciate any help in tracing Fanny Murphy's background. I have some information relating to the Bouldings from the 1861 and 1881 census returns but would be grateful for any other leads."

YORKSHIRE FAMILY HISTORY

The York Minster data-bank contains more than half a million entries relating to Yorkshire men and women, mostly before 1550. The earliest entries are from the second century, but the main bulk of entries starts in 1086 with Domesday Survey. The sources include: Probate records such as wills, inventories and monumental inscriptions; membership of religious guilds; lists of freemen; civic officials; parish registers and mister records; charters; local and national government records; legal records; taxation returns; accounts and, finally, court and ecclesiastical records. Some of the material is taken from original manuscripts that are not readily available to the public. The Minster is a non-profit making organisation, and any surplus funds are ploughed back into research.

A search for a surname and its variants costs £10, but there is no charge for an unsuccessful search. Enquiries with ordinary and E-mail address, and a cheque payable to the Dean and Chapter of York, should be sent to the Minster Library, Dean's Park, York. Cheques in US, Canadian, Australian or NZ Dollars for the equivalent of £10 are welcome.
